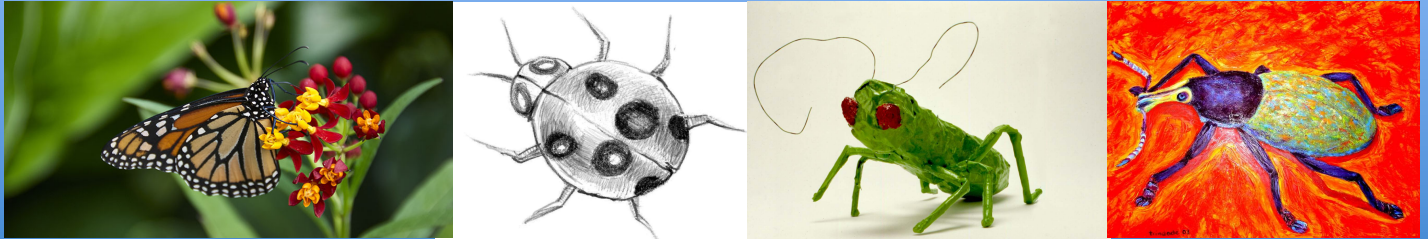


Buggy Art Contest

Categories

Age groups: ELEM (Grades K-5), MIDDLE (Grades 6-8), HS (Grades 9-12), ADULT

Art types: Drawing/painting, photography, and sculpture

Prizes: Prizes and award ribbons will be presented for each art type in each age group.

Rules

- All entries must be the original work of the entrant – no traced or copyright protected images.
- All entries must be “bug-related” (e.g. insects, arachnids, centipedes, etc.).
- 11” x 14” (including mat and frame) drawings, paintings, and photographs preferred.
- Only one artwork per person.
- A completed entry form must accompany all entries.
